Summer Bible Study: Prayer; #4: David's Prayer of Blessing (1 Chronicles 29:10-22)

- Prayer is the puzzling practice of communicating with God.
- David's prayer of blessing teaches us why and how to praise God when we pray.

The Context of David's Prayer of Blessing (1 Chronicles 29:10-22):

- · Date: c. 970 B.C.
- Defining moments of David's kingdom:
 - 1) The ark is brought to Jerusalem (1 Chronicles 16).
 - 2) The temple is prepared (1 Chronicles 29).

"The climax of David's reign, as portrayed by the Chronicler, has now been reached. All the preparations for building the temple have been completed, and Solomon, chosen by God as the one who shall bring the plans to fruition, is about to be proclaimed as king over all Israel.

And at this point the Chronicler reveals his true heart: the proper response to such a situation is a prayer which breathes joyful faith and simple humility."

The Content of David's Prayer of Blessing (1 Chronicles 29:10-22):

I. David *adores* God for who He is (29:10, 13). "bless" = "to praise, adore, kneel"
